# Introduction

Many of us who put this guide together have experienced violence and the loss of our loved ones firsthand. We know there are many things you need to help you through this time, and not all of it will be found in this guide. For example, you may feel angry and may even have thoughts of 'revenge'. We have heard mothers speak to the friends of their sons, pleading that they not commit violence in the name of their lost sons, begging that these friends not force this pain on another mother, asking that that they not throw away their lives by becoming murderers themselves. Here you will find organizations that can help the families of those who have been killed and community leaders who have experience in creating a space for a mother or a father to share these same words with the friends and family of his lost child. And, you will find other resources that people who work with victims of violence and homicide consider to be very helpful.

# How To Use This Manual

This manual was designed for those whose friend or loved one was murdered. It is laid out in a timeline, starting with resources during the initial crisis to long-term recovery support. Most of these resources are based in San Francisco, but not all of them.

## The First 24 hours



### What should I do now? What can I expect?

There are many things you may need to think about now, and later too. You may wonder who you can talk to for emotional help. You might ask about practical problems too. Where is your loved one's body? How can you pay for the funeral? How can you get police to help you?

This booklet will show you what you can do for help right now, and what you can do to help with other problems later. We know that nothing can bring back your loved one. But maybe we can help you during this difficult time.

## I can't believe this has happened. Who should I talk to?



### • Step 1: Am I safe right now?

If you feel unsafe, you should **call 911** now and explain what happened. They can get you medical and police help. Also you can call San Francisco General Hospital's emergency line at **415-206-8111.** 

### • Step 2: I am safe, but I am in shock. What can I do?

If you are at San Francisco General Hospital, one of the *Social Workers* in the emergency room will speak with you. You can reach that hospital at **415-206-8111**. The **social worker** will give you a list of people you can call right away. If you are not there, you can call the people listed below.

• Crisis Response Service (CRS): These are services provided by the Department of Public Health of San Francisco. CRT Crisis Responders provide emotional support, funeral assistance, and other support service referrals for crime victims and their families.

# A Day or Two after



Your loved one has probably been brought to the San Francisco Medical Examiner's Office. This office examines your loved one's body and tries to find out what happened. That way, if a crime was committed, they can find information to bring people to justice. Your loved one can be collected by the funeral home of your choice.

### How can I pay for a funeral? Who might help me pay my other bills?



You may get help to pay for some costs associated with this tragedy. The California Victim Compensation and Government Claims Board (VCGCB) may provide you with help to pay for some of these expenses. Some of the costs they cover include burial and funeral, relocation (moving), loss of support for dependent children or wage loss if you missed work as a result of the murder. Separate from other help, they provide up to \$7,500 just for burial and funeral. This program will also provide payment for mental health services for the family for a while after the death.

- It is important to apply in the first few days. You may be eligible for an emergency award. Save all receipts for all expenses during this time; some of this may be reimbursed by VCGCB. You have up to one year to file your claim.

### Days to Weeks I want justice for my loved one. Where can I get legal help?

A summer school provides learning, socialization and English tutoring for low-to moderate-income school children through daily classes, cultural outings, and recreational activities. Some families may be required to pay an annual assessment fee (\$20) and/or annual enrollment fee based on family size and income.
